

CIRCUIT OF THE WORLD'S HISTORY.

THE UNITED STATES.

The most important event in American annals has been the return of the Democratic party to power. On March 4 was brought to a close a period of twenty-four years of Republican administration, during which the Union had been preserved, the National debt reduced nearly one-half, specie payments resumed, a National banking system established, the industries of the country diversified and developed by protection, slavery abolished, and Civil Service reform introduced. The Democratic party, which had been on the wrong side of nearly every public question during that period, resumed on that day the responsibilities of office, which its last Presidential representative, James Buchanan, had pusillanimously shirked and which his colleagues had treasonably renounced. The prominence given to the South in the Cabinet appointments, the selection of Confederate generals and Northern Copperheads for conspicuous posts at home and abroad, and the lowering of the National flag for Jefferson Thompson, indicated the continuity of Democratic administration in 1884 and 1860. The rejection by the Democratic House of a provision in the Sundry Civil Appropriation bill empowering the President to suspend silver coinage (February 26) proved that the party was as persistent in its opposition to sound principles of finance and as ready to destroy National credit as it was when it had advocated inflation, fought against specie resumption and plotted against the National banks. Ten months of Democratic Administration have demonstrated that it is the same old party that has returned to power, that it has forgotten as little as it has learned, and that it is ill-prepared to sustain genuine measures of reform.

The closing session of the XLVIIIth Congress was barren of important results. The principal measures enacted were bills providing for the admission of French spoliation claims to the Court of Claims within two years; prohibiting the prepayment of transportation or the importation of foreign contract labor; restoring General Grant's rank in the army on the retired list; returning the residue of the Chinese Indemnity to the Chinese Government; appropriating \$1,895,000 for the construction of two cruisers, one heavily armed gunboat and one light gunboat; reducing rates of postage; and regulating settlements in the Indian Territory and the forfeiture of certain railroad lands. Legislation of the first importance was abandoned. The bills for regulating the Presidential succession and the counting of the Electoral vote were not carried through the lower house. Silver coinage was not suspended, although the necessity for it was apparent in

February, when the New-York banks were forced to receive silver certificates in payment of balances due from the Government to the Clearing House. Even Mr. Cleveland's letter to Mr. Warner favoring the immediate suspension of silver coinage was without effect, and by the decisive vote of 149 to 118 the House declined to allow him to act upon his discretion. Measures for the promotion of interstate commerce, the reorganization of the Supreme Court, the re-enactment of a National bankruptcy law, the strengthening of the National banks and the encouragement of the merchant marine were not passed. With the good measures the bad failed also—crude silver inflation bills and the proposed scheme of tariff revision.

The important treaties negotiated by President Arthur's Administration were not confirmed by the Senate, although exhaustively discussed in executive session. The Nicaragua Canal convention was laboriously defended by Senator Edmunds on the ground that it did not violate the provisions of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty and that in any event that treaty was not binding upon the United States Government. The opponents of the convention controverted both of these propositions and maintained that the United States could not assume the whole cost of the enterprise and all the responsibilities of a protectorate, if Great Britain were left in full possession of the right of joint control over the canal. The commercial treaties with Spain and Santo Domingo were opposed on the ground that they created revenue for Cuba and the West Indies without offering any advantages to the United States commensurate with the sacrifices entailed. Senator Morrill took issue with any and every reciprocity treaty with an inferior State, contending that such conventions were unconstitutional, and were prohibited by the most favored nation treatment accorded to European States. All these treaties were withdrawn by President Cleveland last March for examination by the new Administration. In his Message he condemned the canal convention on broad grounds and indicated that any reciprocity treaty concluded by the Administration with Spain would be free from the grave objections urged against the recent treaty. The Mexican treaty still awaits the stipulated legislation required to render it operative. The commercial policy which Secretary Frelinghuysen so strenuously advocated has collapsed from sheer inanition.

President Cleveland's inaugural produced a favorable impression in consequence of its conservative tone and his professions of sincere interest in Civil Service reform and his assurances that he aimed to conduct a business-like administration and to uphold the rights of citizenship in the South. Ten months have intervened, during which it has been possible to compare his practice with his professions. In the conduct of foreign affairs he has maintained a safe, if not particularly brilliant, policy. Some of his diplomatic appointments have been exceptionally good, but the consular service, which had been steadily improved under Republican administration, and recruited mainly from the commercial classes, has been converted into a clearing-house for the liquidation of political debts. The rejection of Mr. Keiley at two foreign courts, and the deliberate neglect to appoint his successor at Vienna, have exposed the State Department to ridicule at home and abroad; and in the official correspondence Secretary Bayard succeeds in making a diplomatic burlesque of this fantastic episode. The foreign relations of this country have been as dull as they have been peaceable. The most striking incident has been the employment of United States marines in keeping the transit open across the Isthmus of Darien during the Colombian revolution.

The general administration of the departments has been conducted with an ostentatious display of business-like capacity and of practical ability. In three of them, in addition to the State Department, there have been lamentable administrative failures. The Postmaster-General declined to pay to American steamship lines an appropriation of \$400,000, which Congress had designed exclusively for them as a legitimate compensation for carrying foreign mails. The companies refused to do the work for inadequate rates and the Government, in making clumsy and artificial arrangements for mail transportation, has caused serious inconvenience to the business community, besides discriminating unjustly against American shipping. The abandonment of the Australian line was another development of the same

hostile policy. Secretary Whitney meanwhile was conducting a similar warfare upon the American shipbuilding industry. The Dolphin was rejected, the Advisory Board was discredited, the completion of the cruisers delayed, and the contractor for the four vessels driven into bankruptcy in a series of systematic attempts to make political capital for the Administration without reference to the requirements of the Navy or to common justice. The Attorney-General not only co-operated with Secretary Whitney in this war upon a great industry, but brought lasting reproach upon the Administration by allowing his department to be used to promote the speculative ends of a telephone company in which he was financially interested. In view of these unbusiness-like and reckless proceedings, the claim that the Government has been conducted on plain, practical, common-sense principles has been successfully traversed by the opponents of the Administration.

The President's avowed interest in Civil Service reform in reality constitutes the main ground upon which it is entitled to respectful consideration. There have been many conspicuously bad appointments and the plea of offensive partisanship has been a transparent device for removing efficient public servants and rewarding working politicians; but it is nevertheless true that fewer changes have been made than were anticipated a year ago, and that the President has evinced sincerity of purpose and painstaking care in selecting men for office. The confirming power of the Republican Senate has undoubtedly exercised a wholesome restraint upon the Executive and he has not been unwilling to have the reputation of being more advanced on this subject than his party, which has shown little sympathy with practical reforms in the civil service. While the President held his own State in the November election the nomination of Governor Hill was a distinctive triumph for the spoils element in the Democratic party, which is also hostile to reform in State or Nation.

The Republicans carried Ohio, in the face of election frauds in Cincinnati, and showed themselves to be in good fighting order in other States. Elections were held by twenty Legislatures for United States Senators, the most interesting contests being in New-York and Illinois, where Mr. Everts and General Logan were chosen, the latter on the 118th ballot. General Logan was the choice of the Republicans for presiding officer of the Senate after the death of the Vice-President, but declined to serve. Senator Sherman was thereupon elected. The immediate passage by the Senate of the Hoar Succession bill, under which the Secretary of State will succeed the President in case of death indicated that the Republicans were unwilling to make a political use of the Vice-President's death and were influenced by a commendable desire to settle a constitutional question of momentous importance. The Vice-President's death was only second in interest to that of General Grant, which produced a profound impression throughout the country. Congress assembled in December to receive an exhaustive review of the Administration's performance and recommendations. Speaker Carlisle was re-elected and a revision of the rules was carried by which a general legislation in appropriation bills is prohibited, and the chances of increased grants for all purposes are promoted. The Republican Senate will be a barrier against extravagance and already shows signs of adopting a conservative course on all public questions, including the President's nominations.

The year opened with great disheartenment in business circles, the result of the panic of 1884, and of the prostration of industries which followed the Presidential election. During the first half of the year there was no recovery, and the gloom was increased by reports of great injury to the wheat crop. The prices of stocks wavered with but little change from the low average of the preceding December, rallying about \$4 per share near the end of February, but declining to the lowest point of the year early in May. Nearly two months of uncertainty followed, with little change in prices. Foreign imports were smaller in January and February than in any two months since early in 1879, while domestic exports, though large in January, were lower in February and March than in the corresponding months for eight years, and continued low through the summer. The stagnation of business was reflected in the accumulation of idle

money in the banks, which was \$125,000,000, larger than ever before, at the beginning of the year, but rose to \$144,000,000 in February, and after some decline to \$161,000,000 in July. The price of wheat, which had been lower in 1884 than in any other year for more than a century in Great Britain, remained almost stagnant about 90 to 95 cents until April, and then rapidly rose above \$1 with the reports of injury to the crop, but further advance was stopped by large supplies. The exchanges outside of New-York were lower than for several years previous during the first half of the year, and were scarcely up to the average of 1884 in June.

The latter half of the year presented phenomena of a different character. Mr. Vanderbilt perfected in the summer arrangements with the Pennsylvania and with the owners and creditors of the West Shore, under which the control of the West Shore was transferred to the New-York Central, and the control of the South Pennsylvania to the Pennsylvania Central, and a new compact between the trunk lines was formed. Stocks advanced as soon as the negotiation reached a hopeful state, and continued to advance with little change until the latter part of November, rising above 35 per cent in the general average of prices. The railroads, enabled to sell bonds and encouraged by the new compact to look for more profitable traffic, began to buy railroad iron largely. A combination of steel rail makers advanced prices at the same time, so that the iron mills obtained large orders at prices 25 per cent above those of the early summer. The output of pig iron also increased, and the movement of coal closely approached that of the previous year. Business in many other branches became more active, though the improvement outside of railroad business and railmaking was largely in various branches of speculation. The exchanges expanded so that they exceeded those of the corresponding months of the previous year by 30 to 40 per cent. But imports and exports remained small, the outward movement of domestic products being greatly checked by speculation, and by the depression in Europe and supplies from India and other countries. In November Mr. Gould announced that he would withdraw from the stock market. This was by some considered a notice to his friends that he was not to be expected to participate in lifting prices further. Only a week later Mr. Vanderbilt died suddenly, and though strong holders combined to prevent disaster, some decline in prices followed. The general business of the country had improved as much as speculation had increased in volume. But the year closed with no material reaction, and with the railroad and the iron business in better shape than for several years. Other business was also fairly maintained, and the holiday traffic was considered remarkably satisfactory. Yet exports of domestic products have not revived, and commercial movements toward the end of the year were clouded by apprehension that silver coinage would not be suspended by Congress, and would lead to disaster. In other respects, the outlook toward the close of the year was regarded as promising.

ENGLAND AND IRELAND.

A year of intense political excitement fraught with startling surprises closes with a bright prospect for the legislative independence of Ireland. Public attention was preoccupied with General Gordon's fate and Russian aggression in Asia during the earlier months, but the downfall of the Liberal Ministry, the electoral canvass and Mr. Gladstone's conversion to Home Rule have completely effaced all questions of foreign policy. When Parliament assembled the Conservatives opened an harassing fire upon the Government, proposing one motion of censure after another. In the Lords there was a majority of three to one against the Ministry's Soudan policy. In the Commons there was a close division, with a narrow majority of twelve votes for the Government. Twelve Liberals voted with the Conservatives and fourteen abstained from the division; and the Parnellites united with the Opposition. A division on the Egyptian agreement taken in March resulted in a majority of forty-eight for the Government. During the Russian negotiations party hostili-

ties were temporarily suspended and the Government's proposals for extraordinary financial supplies were generously supported. The Ministry were discredited at home and abroad by their failure to relieve Khartoum, their idle military demonstration on the coast of the Red Sea and their costly preparations for a campaign with Russia which they lacked the energy and courage to undertake. They had contrived, however, to escape the direct political consequences of their faint-hearted diplomacy. All dangerous questions in the Soudan and Afghanistan had passed nearly out of sight; the redistribution of seats, which was the main work of the session, was approaching completion under the skilful management of Sir Charles Dilke; and there was a clear prospect for a successful termination of the work of the Parliament elected in 1880. Every question except one had been either settled, shirked or compromised. That single question proved fatal to the Ministry.

This was the Irish question. The Crimes Act was about to run out. The Cabinet were not able to agree upon the policy of renewing or modifying it. The Radical members wished to drop it altogether and Mr. Gladstone sided with them; but Lord Spencer and the Whigs insisted upon retaining some of the most important provisions. The Government finally resolved to abandon the coercive clauses and proposed to invest the Viceroy with discretionary power to enforce the procedure clauses relating to change of venue, special juries and boycotting. The retention of the boycotting clauses had been decided upon, but the Cabinet had not determined whether these should be left subject to executive discretion. The Radical members were dissatisfied and the divisions of opinion in the Cabinet were certain to involve serious divisions on the Liberal side of the Commons. At this juncture a motion introduced by Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, respecting the budget, offered a convenient opportunity for a change of Government. While the Ministry could not be openly charged with biding for a fall, their relief and enjoyment of the situation when they had been defeated made it apparent that they had not exerted themselves to avoid the catastrophe. The critical division occurred on June 8. The Parnellites combined with the Conservatives and defeated the Government by a vote of 264 to 252. Only four Liberals voted in opposition, the defeat being caused by an unusual number of abstentions on that side as compared with the number of Conservative absentees. The financial question was of secondary importance. Opposition to the succession duties could have been readily overcome, if there had been no divisions respecting the Crimes Act. The Ministry which passed the Land Act, the Franchise and Redistribution virtually fell on the question of retaining a Coercion Act when agrarian crime had ceased in Ireland.

Mr. Gladstone promptly resigned and Lord Salisbury after evincing some hesitation formed a Cabinet, transferring Sir Stafford Northcote to the Upper House and leaving Sir Michael Hicks-Beach leader of the Commons, coached by Lord Randolph Churchill. By abandoning the Crimes Act and courting the support of the Irish members, the new Ministry placed the Whigs in the anomalous attitude of being more conservative than the Conservatives themselves. Lord Randolph Churchill by virtue of his audacity and talents was promoted to the India Office from the select council of the Fourth party and all his colleagues were suitably provided for, even Sir Henry Drummond Wolff securing a special diplomatic mission to Constantinople. The new Ministry made an adroit use of their opportunities. Foreign questions were rapidly disposed of in a conservative spirit on the lines marked out by their predecessors. The Egyptian loan was put on the market with the aid of Prince Bismarck and issued on advantageous terms for the money-lenders, if not for the Cairo treasury; the evacuation of the Soudan was hastened; the understanding respecting Zulfikar Pass was faithfully carried out. The time was short, but before the session closed (August 14) the Australian confederation, Scotch Secretary, Irish Land Purchase, Dwellings for the Poor and Criminal Law Amendment bills had been added to the statute books—the last measure mainly in consequence of an agitation headed by Mr. Stead, who was subsequently imprisoned on criminal charges. The Conservatives spared no

effort to conciliate Mr. Parnell and received from him assurances of Irish support in doubtful constituencies in England.

All parties were already deep in the conflict of the general election. Mr. Parnell in Ireland was organizing a compact and well-disciplined force. Mr. Chamberlain was in the field with many crude proposals respecting land legislation offered with a view to attracting the votes of the new electors. Moderate Liberals under the leadership of Lord Hartington and Mr. Goschen were recoiling from this extreme policy. There were signs of unexampled activity and strife everywhere; and as the November contest approached excitement and bad passion increased. Whigs and Radicals were apparently bent upon defeating each other, equally unmindful of the risks of a Conservative triumph and the certainty of Mr. Parnell's gaining a commanding position between the two parties. Mr. Gladstone issued a comprehensive election manifesto, but refrained until the last fortnight from exerting his authority as leader and enforcing discipline. The Conservatives, meanwhile, without presenting any distinctive issues of their own, were making use of the Irish vote in England, appealing to the fears of Churchmen in regard to Disestablishment, and representing Mr. Chamberlain as the real leader of the Liberal party and more of a Socialist than a Radical. Under these circumstances the country was called upon to make its choice between parties.

The general result of the elections was a tie between the Liberals on one side and the Conservatives and the Nationalists on the other. The Liberals carried 244 seats in England, 27 in Wales and 62 in Scotland, a total of 333. The Conservatives won 220 seats in England, 3 in Wales, 10 in Scotland and 18 in Ireland, a total of 251. The Nationalists had 86 seats including one from England. Outside Ireland the Liberals outnumbered the Conservatives by 100. In the United Kingdom they had a plurality of 82, but were in a minority of 4 with the Conservatives and Nationalists combined. Lancashire and the metropolitan and suburban boroughs of London had gone heavily against the Liberals, but there had been unexpected gains in the counties where the new electors displayed gratitude for the Franchise Act and interest in Mr. Chamberlain's land proposals. The enfranchisement of nearly 2,000,000 electors and the adoption of a democratic system of electoral divisions based largely upon population produced few changes in the character of Parliamentary representation. Mr. Arch, the leader of the agricultural laborers, was elected and as many as ten workingmen's candidates; but the new members were mainly recruited from titled families and country gentry and the middle classes. Mr. Parnell's triumph was complete. He carried a majority of the Ulster counties besides having a solid delegation from each of the other provinces. The commanding position which he had been struggling to obtain was at last won. No English party could govern the country without his help.

Fertile in surprises as the elections had been, the sequel was even more startling. Mr. Gladstone, after his unsuccessful appeal to the country for a Liberal majority large enough to settle the Irish question independently of the Nationalists, conferred with his leading Whig associates and announced his conversion to home rule. The details of his scheme have not been authoritatively set forth, but he is apparently ready to make the largest concessions to the island, including a Parliament and a Cabinet in Dublin, under limitations and safeguards for the unity of the Empire. Lord Rosebery is the only prominent Liberal who has unequivocally committed himself to Mr. Gladstone's new Irish policy. The Radical orators have been momentarily dazed by the spectacle of their despised leader occupying a position on this question far in advance of themselves. The Whigs have been startled and the Conservatives overjoyed by what both consider a fatal mistake on the part of Mr. Gladstone. But he has the logic of the political situation on his side. The overwhelming majorities cast for the Nationalist candidates and Mr. Parnell's unchallenged dictatorship in the new Parliament are convincing arguments for a change in the relations of England and Ireland. The Nationalists have won a most powerful ally in Mr. Gladstone, even if the Liberal party be no longer united, but rent asunder with dissensions. Mr. Parnell has

only to keep the Irish people under restraint—and the cessation of dynamite outrages since the explosions at the Tower and Parliament Houses indicates that he can succeed in doing so—and to persevere in his demand that they shall be allowed to govern themselves in their own way, and home rule will be conceded.

THE SOUDAN CAMPAIGNS.

Khartoum was the centre of interest for the British Empire when the year opened. There was a solitary English sentry there on guard for nearly a year, defending the city against assault from fanatical hordes of Arabs, against treachery within the walls and against a Government in London which, when it happened to know its mind upon Egyptian policy, deferred decision until it was too late to act successfully. All Christendom had become interested in his fate, and was eagerly awaiting tidings of his rescue by the expedition that had been ascending the Nile in open boats. Lord Wolseley, on arriving at Korti, had received from General Gordon a secret message reporting the straits to which he had been reduced, and urging the desperate need of haste in the advance of the expedition. He decided to divide his forces into three columns, one to make a forced march across the desert to Metemneh, a second to support this movement from Korti, if reinforcements should be needed, and a third to follow the long eastern bend of the Nile to Abou Hamed, punishing Colonel Stewart's murderers by the way. The flying column, 1,500 men strong, was commanded by Sir Herbert Stewart. It traversed the desert a distance of nearly 180 miles, making a halt at Gakdul, and on January 17 narrowly escaped defeat at Abou Klea. The column had a running fight from the battlefield to Gubat on the Nile, the commander being mortally wounded. There the English were joined by a portion of General Gordon's force who had descended the Nile in four steamers. After threatening an assault upon Metemneh, Sir Charles Wilson started for Khartoum on January 24 with two steamers. He approached the city on the fourth day, but learned that it had fallen two days before (January 26); that the gates had been opened by treachery; that General Gordon had been killed, and that the Mahdi's victorious army of 40,000 Arabs could now march northward. The costly expedition after the tedious passage of the cataracts, the forced marches across the desert and the desperate fighting had arrived forty-eight hours too late. The sentry had disappeared from the rampart.

Not only had the objective point of the expedition suddenly vanished, but the scattered divisions of the English army were in imminent peril. Sir Charles Wilson's steamers, returning from Khartoum, were wrecked in the river, and the force was rescued only with great difficulty by Lord Charles Beresford. The reinforcements sent to Gabat under Sir Redvers Buller arrived without fighting, but the signal was almost immediately given for retreat from an untenable position. This movement was successfully conducted during February. The column marching eastward had meanwhile won a brilliant victory near Dulka, General Barle being killed. General Brackenbury was approaching Abou Hammed when his force was recalled to Korti and Dongoia. Orders had been issued by the Government for dispatching 10,000 British troops and 2,500 Sikhs and Sepoys to Suakim under General Graham to clear the road to Berber. This force was rapidly concentrated in March, and a desultory campaign against Osman Digna was begun. A brigade commanded by Sir John McNeill was surprised by the Arabs, and the Hindostanees were stampeded, the English regiments holding their position with steadiness and rescuing the army from disastrous defeat. The attempt to build a railroad was only moderately successful, the troops suffered terribly from the climate, and the campaign was an inglorious one. The Government decided during the crisis of affairs with Russia to abandon the proposed advance upon Khartoum. The regiments were sent back to England and Egypt, and the Australian regiment to the South Seas, without having accomplished any useful purpose. Thou-

sands of Arabs had been slaughtered, but Gordon had neither been rescued nor his death avenged.

The death of the Mahdi and the disappearance of Osman seemed to remove all necessity for further military intervention in the Soudan. The Arabs, flushed with victory and led by one of the Mahdi's successors, suddenly appeared at Dongola in December and threatened Wady Halfa and Ambigol with attack. These were outposts of the British line of defence for Lower Egypt. All disposable troops were ordered to the front and three regiments were sent from England to reinforce the Egyptian garrison. The financial embarrassments of the Khedive's Government have been temporarily relieved by the loan of \$40,000,000 negotiated by England with the consent of the Powers. Sir Henry Drummond Wolff's mission to Constantinople resulted in the appointment of a joint commission for the settlement of affairs in Upper Egypt. Moukhtar Pacha has not yet arrived at Cairo, and the resumption of hostilities in the Dongola district threatens to nullify this diplomatic agreement. British policy in the Soudan from first to last has been unintelligible.

BRITISH DEPENDENCIES.

The "weary Titan," as Englishmen are now accustomed to personify the British Empire, has been forced to bear many additional burdens. St. Lucia Bay, in Zululand, was occupied in January, and a protectorate was declared over the whole eastern coast between Cape Colony and Natal. In the interior, as the result of Sir Charles Warren's expedition to Bechuanaland, a protectorate over a vast region was proclaimed. Owing to resistance offered by Sir Hercules Robinson and the Cape Government and to indecision on the part of the Home Government this special mission has been less satisfactory in its results than was anticipated. Sir Charles Warren had done his work well, but had not been properly supported from London. He was recalled in August and a local magistrate at the Cape was appointed to succeed him. In the South Seas the islands between New-Guinea and Australia were annexed. A protectorate was also declared over a large portion of New-Guinea. The confederation scheme adopted by the British Parliament renders it possible for the colonies to take concerted action in regard to Australian policy. Two of them, New-South Wales and New-Zealand, have not yet shown any disposition to unite in this movement.

In the Dominion of Canada Riel's rebellion has been the most important event of the year. This outbreak of the half-breeds of the Saskatchewan was largely the result of negligence on the part of the authorities in meeting demands for land patents for holdings and legislation. Riel's force was not formidable in numbers, probably not over 1,200 men. At Fish Creek it fought General Middleton's troops for twelve hours in a deep hollow and then retreated to the Batouches. A bayonet charge brought this campaign to a close. Riel surrendered and Poundmaker, his chief ally, not long after. There was no general uprising of the Indians. Riel was condemned to death and executed. The French-Canadian population of Montreal and Quebec were intensely excited by his fate and Sir John Macdonald has lost his political prestige in quarters where the largest Conservative majorities have been obtained.

The largest accession of political responsibility has been in Burmah. King Thebaw's confiscation of the property of the Bombay Trading Company involved reprisals from India. He was called upon to receive a British envoy at Mandalay and to submit the disputed points to arbitration. His contemptuous refusal was followed by a military expedition. General Prendergast, after capturing the Minhla forts, proceeded up the Irrawaddy with his flotilla, meeting with no resistance. General Prendergast entered Mandalay (November 28), deposed the King and sent him to Rangoon as a prisoner of war. No decree for the annexation of Burmah has yet been is-

sued and the country is temporarily governed by four of Thebaw's Ministers.

Lord Dufferin has handed over the fortress of Gwalior to the Maharajah Scindiah and allowed him to keep 3,000 more troops. The relations of the Viceroy and the Ameer have steadily improved since the conferences at Rawal Pindi. The strengthening of the northwestern frontier of India is now recognized by both parties in England as the true policy rather than the inviolability of the Afghan frontier.

RUSSIA AND AFGHANISTAN.

Russian diplomacy has scored an important success in Afghanistan, if it has failed to carry its point in deposing Prince Alexander and recovering its influence in Bulgaria. After the conquest of Merv and the extension of Colonel Alikhanoff's outposts to Sarakhs, the Foreign Office proposed a joint Boundary Commission for the delimitation of the Afghan frontier. The British Government consented to co-operate in this work and dispatched Sir Peter Lumsden with a large staff of officers and surveyors to Western Afghanistan. The Russian Commissioners did not receive orders to go to the frontier and General Komaroff was left at liberty to advance his outposts. Penjdeh had previously been occupied by the Ameer's forces. Colonel Alikhanoff appeared before the fort in the hope of exciting a Turcoman uprising against the garrison, and failing in this pushed forward his forces by stealthy approaches toward Penjdeh and Zulikar—the real gates of Herat. Sir Peter Lumsden informed the British Government of these advances and the diplomatic negotiations began. Lord Granville demanded that the outposts should be withdrawn from debatable points; M. de Giers would not consent to this; and Lord Granville reiterated the intention of the British Government to secure for the Ameer all the territory to which he was justly entitled. On March 13 Mr. Gladstone informed the Commons that Russia had agreed that there should be no advance pending the final decision of the commission. M. de Giers had accepted this arrangement, however, with the reservation, "unless in the case of some extraordinary reason such, for instance, as a disturbance at Penjdeh." Within a fortnight there was a battle at Pul-i-Khisti in which the Afghan troops were defeated by the Russians with great loss, and Penjdeh was occupied.

This breach of faith was accepted throughout Europe as a cause of war, especially as extensive military preparations had been made on both sides. There had been a continuous movement of Russian troops from the Caucasus to the Afghan frontier and the war party was uppermost in St. Petersburg. Two camps had been formed on the Afghan-Indian frontier and an army of reserves was gathering. The Ameer's forces were preparing for war. In England the reserves and militia had been called out, the fleet had been put in readiness and immense purchases of war material made. Mr. Gladstone in moving a vote of credit pronounced the situation critical, although not hopeless. War seemed inevitable when his speech was made. Yet within a week England proposed and Russia accepted arbitration of the Pul-i-Khisti battle and an agreement was made that the frontier should be virtually settled in London on the Russian lines. This astonishing diplomatic settlement included the permanent occupation of Penjdeh by Russia, the retention of Zulikar Pass by the Ameer and the acceptance of M. Lessar's proposed frontier. The Ameer apparently had been unwilling to fight for Penjdeh and had informed Lord Dufferin at Rawal Pindi that he could not hold himself responsible for the conduct of his people, if the British were to return to Candahar and march to Herat. The arbitration scheme eventually proved an artificial device for covering the retreat of the British Ministry. No stress was laid upon it in the final settlement and Russia was allowed to retain the territory acquired by stealth and breach of faith. One of the two rivals for supremacy in Asia had defied the other, invaded Afghanistan and secured commanding positions in front of Herat.

AUSTRIA AND THE BALKAN.

The conflict of races still goes on in the Dual Empire. The June elections in Austria proper were contested mainly on grounds of race animosity and resulted in the triumph of Count Taaffe's coalition party of Czechs, Poles, Clericalists and Southern Slavs. The German Liberals made a desperate effort to regain their ascendancy, but owing to the extension of the franchise and faction feuds lost as many as twenty seats. The strengthening of Count Taaffe's majority renders the western half of the Empire more strongly Slav than ever. This is a result which the Magyars in Hungary view with marked dissatisfaction. At the same time their dislike of the German tariff steadily increases and has been strongly evinced by their Premier, Herr Tisza. Both Hungary and Austria are anxious to extend their trade with Rumania, Servia and the Balkan peninsula, and a joint commercial policy has made it possible for the rival races to pull together in the year's diplomacy. The railway system has been extended to the capital of Bosnia; a military road has been constructed thence to Novi Bazar; and Pesth has been connected with the new Servian railways. Each half of the Empire has vast commercial interests at stake in the Balkan. For this reason the revolution in East Rumelia and the disastrous Servian campaign have been events of the first magnitude in Austrian diplomacy.

The revolution occurred unexpectedly (September 18). The South Bulgarians revolted against the Turkish Governor, deposed him, appointed a provisional government and declared the principality and the province united. Prince Alexander at once mobilized his army, started for Philippopolis and proclaimed himself Prince of North and South Bulgaria. The Mussulman soldiery were quietly disarmed, and the revolution was accomplished without bloodshed. The success of the movement excited the jealousy and rapacity of both Servia and Greece, and in each State the army was placed on a war footing. The European Powers were dismayed by the facility with which the Treaty of Berlin had been set aside and alarmed by the prospect of the kindling of a general conflagration in the East. The first impulse on their part was to recognize accomplished facts as speedily as possible, give their sanction to the union of the Bulgarians and disarm Servia and Greece. The two Powers most directly interested in the Balkan speedily contrived to modify this policy. Russia, having neglected to extend its system of railways into Bulgaria, had become dependent upon the sovereign's good offices in maintaining its influence in the principality. Prince Alexander finding Russian officials rapacious and unpopular had dismissed them and was governing the country without regard to advice from St. Petersburg. For this reason the Czar was bent upon getting rid of him even at the risk of separating the Bulgarians. In order that the Russian policy might be understood throughout Europe, Prince Alexander was deprived of his colonelcy in a regiment and publicly disgraced. Austria, in the meantime, had encouraged Servia to arm and threaten Bulgaria with invasion, and had supported the Russian demand for a return to the status quo in Eastern Rumelia.

The Balkan States agreed to await the decision of the Conference before moving. On November 13 King Milan declared war on Bulgaria, and his army advanced on Sophia. Prince Alexander's garrisons fell back from the frontier stubbornly fighting, and on the third day after the declaration of war he defeated the main Servian column at Slivnitsa, and subsequently routed the entire army of invasion, driving it across the frontier. In these battles the Servians lost 7,000 men. The Austrian Government came to their rescue, menacing Prince Alexander with retaliation if he should continue the war. An armistice was agreed upon and will probably result in a careful survey of the present boundary between the two countries. The Sultan, after concentrating a strong army for operations against either Greece or Bulgaria, attempted to send commissioners to Philippopolis and to regain control of Eastern Rumelia. Prince Alexander's victories meanwhile had modified the plans of the Powers. Russian opposition to Bulgarian unity had disappeared. England by allowing the Conference to collapse had taken the risk of a European war, but had co-operated

most effectively with Prince Alexander. While the question is still open, it is apparent that Europe will sanction the union of the Bulgarians. Servia has been deservedly punished for its bad faith; cautious Greece, as usual, gets no return for its military budget; and the Porte clings tenaciously to the remnant of its European Empire. But in Bulgaria a man has arisen capable of playing a great part in the future history of the Balkan.

GERMANY.

Prince Bismarck has pursued his new commercial policy with characteristic energy. To the German settlements at Angra Pequena have been added stations at the Cameroons on the west coast and in Zanzibar on the east coast of Africa, and portions of New-Guinea, together with the Marshall, Gilbert and other groups in Polynesia. Steam lines have been subsidized and a serious effort has been made to turn these colonies to practical account, but the returns so far are very meagre. The most important field for commercial enterprise yet occupied is Zanzibar, where the Sultan was forced to sanction the arbitrary arrangements made by German agents. The Chancellor was irritated by Lord Derby's and Lord Granville's dealings with him, but was convinced after Count Herbert Bismarck's visit to London that England was not disposed to interfere with Germany's commercial ventures. The seizure of the Caroline Islands was resented by Spain and permanent occupation was not attempted. The Congo Conference was held at Berlin and the King of the Belgians was constituted the titular sovereign of the immense free State, which was declared open to the commerce of the world.

The expulsion of thousands of Poles from Eastern Prussia and Silesia has been attended with great suffering and has excited the indignation of Catholics. Prince Bismarck, reasoning that the immigration of Poles, which came rolling across the frontier like an avalanche, was fraught with danger to the country, determined to beat it back by main force. On December 1 there was a scene in the Reichstag when the Polish deputies supported by the Ultramontane Centre rose to condemn the decrees for expulsion. Prince Bismarck replied by an imperial message, declaring that such an interpellation was an attack upon the rights of a confederated State, since Prussia alone had the right to check hostile immigration by legislation and the Reichstag could not interfere in the matter. The number of Poles expelled is said to be nearly 35,000.

FRANCE.

It has been a year of political reaction in France. M. Ferry, persevering obstinately in his attempt to secure a tropical Empire, proposed a land march to Peking. General Camponon resigned the War Ministry rather than accept his share of responsibility for these distant operations. M. Ferry succeeded in carrying an order of the day by a vote of 294 to 234 and was enabled to forward 12,000 reinforcements to Tonquin. The opposition which he encountered, warned him that he could not undertake a campaign in China. The desultory operations of the fleet continued, Admiral Courbet abandoning Formosa and attacking the Chinese fleet near Chin Hai where he destroyed several vessels by means of torpedo-boats. General Negrier entered Langson (February 14) after an harassing march, but did not have a sufficiently strong force to maintain his position. On March 22 he attacked the Chinese and after forty-eight hours of fighting was repulsed with great loss. When the news of this disaster reached Paris, M. Ferry demanded a credit of \$40,000,000 for the continuance of the war. M. Clemenceau denounced the Ministers as little better than criminals and defeated them by a vote of 308 to 161. Peace was abruptly concluded with China (June 9) on terms singularly favorable to France. Anam and Tonquin passed under French control, China retaining a nominal sovereignty over the former, and the exact frontiers being referred to a joint commission. Provision was made for the extension of French trade,

but no exclusive concessions were obtained. The war had been as costly as it was unpopular. In July there was an insurrection at Hué and General de Courcy was attacked and had to be supported from Tonquin. The natives in Anam have risen against the Catholic mission and massacred 24,000 Christians, burning schoolhouses and chapels.

M. Brisson succeeded M. Ferry, with M. de Freycinet as Minister of Foreign Affairs. He had been President of the Deputies and was accounted a strong man, but disappointed the expectations of politicians by neglecting to exercise effective leadership. The general elections were approaching. The Scrutin de Liste, which had been substituted for the Scrutin d'Arrondissement, was expected to work the miracle predicted by M. Gambetta—efface the Monarchical factions and convert the Republican party into an homogeneous organization. M. Brisson instead of furnishing the Republicans with an electoral programme and exerting real political authority, allowed M. Ferry to usurp his place as the leader of the Gambettists. He remained silent for a season and then feebly seconded his rival's proposals. The country, irritated by the prominence of the man who was held responsible for the unpopular Tonquin policy, made its choice between the clearly defined radicalism of M. Clemenceau and the reactionary policy of the Monarchists. The result of the first day's election in October gave the Republicans 136 and the Monarchists 187 seats outside Paris, with 222 second ballots required. The appearance of this strong Monarchical party brought the Republicans to their senses. They combined on the second ballots (October 18) and obtained a clear majority. The general result was: Opportunists, 230; Radicals, 150; Reactionaries, 204. The Opportunists had met with serious losses owing to the opposition of the clergy and the strong feeling against the colonial policy. The Radicals under M. Clemenceau had obtained a commanding position since, by combining with the Reactionaries, they could overthrow any Ministry that might be formed.

The French Deputies reassembled (November 11), elected M. Floquet President, and defeated M. Spuller, Opportunist, for the office of Second Vice-President by a vote of 201 to 231 for a Radical. This was an ominous beginning, since it revealed the helplessness of the Opportunist Ministry to prevent coalitions between the wings of the Chamber. M. Brisson in spite of a warning received from the Radicals read his programme, acknowledged a deficit and proposed the Tonquin votes. The approaching election of a President of the Republic by the National Assembly has rendered it dangerous for the Radicals to defeat him, and he has taken advantage of the opportunity for disposing of the most troublesome question connected with his administration. The finances are in great disorder. A duty of 3 francs on corn per hectolitre was passed in the spring by a vote of 316 to 175. Other expedients are now required. The political situation in France is unsatisfactory in every respect. The re-election of M. Grévy (December 28) has caused a temporary feeling of relief, but the divisions on the Republican side, menace the existence of present institutions.

ITALY AND SPAIN.

Early in the year Italy, envious of French activity in the East and of German enterprise in Africa and the South Seas, engaged in a barren adventure on the coast of the Red Sea. Beilul and Massowah were occupied, with the consent of the British Government, and certain tribes in the interior were dispersed. The Italian Government was apparently anxious to co-operate with England in relieving Kassala or recapturing Khar-toum, and was temporarily supported by public opinion. The collapse of Lord Wolseley's campaign left the garrison of Massowah and Beilul without occupation and the Ministers were reproached with making a serious miscalculation. Signor Depretis, who on May 8 had a majority of 91, found it necessary a month later to resign, that majority having dwindled to four votes. The Red Sea expedition had proved a failure and the Foreign Minister was held responsible for it. A reorganization of the Ministry was speedily effected.

The Pope finding that extremists in Belgium, Germany, Ireland and

France were offering resistance to his policy and urging him to adopt his predecessors ultramontane methods, has taken them at their word. In a letter to the Archbishop of Paris he has emphasized his own authority, referred to the necessity for subordination in the Church and enforced the supreme duty of obedience to the chief pastor.

The death of King Alfonso has been an event of supreme importance in Spain. He had won the respect of the army by his coolness and soldierly qualities, was reasonably popular, and was a discreet and intelligent sovereign. He had endeared himself to his subjects by such acts as his visitation of the hospitals when the cholera patients were dying at the rate of 700 or 900 a day. His death left the succession a matter of uncertainty, as his oldest daughter is in her sixth year, and there is expectation of the birth of a posthumous child who may be a boy. Under the Constitution Queen Christina was invested with the Regency, and Senor Sagasta reorganized the Ministry. Zorilla and Don Carlos are likely to seize the opportunities for revolution and civil war, for which a protracted regency opens the way. All substantial power is in the hands of the two military chiefs in command in Madrid and the North—Lopez Dominguez and Martinez Campos. The seizure of the Caroline Islands by the German fleet aroused a storm of resentment throughout Spain. In Madrid the Embassy was attacked by a mob, and German citizens were insulted in the streets. The moderation of the German Government in submitting the question to arbitration after suitable apologies had been made for the riotous proceedings in Madrid averted a dangerous crisis in Spain.
