

FOREWORD

This publication, The List and Index of Presidential Orders: Unnumbered Series, marks the first attempt to present to the public a guide to the important material of these documents. It is one of the large number of guides to source materials prepared throughout the United States by the workers of the Historical Records Survey of the Work Projects Administration.

This Survey was originally undertaken in the winter of 1935-36 for the purpose of providing useful employment to needy unemployed historians, lawyers, teachers, and research and clerical workers. In carrying out this objective, the program was organized to compile inventories of historical materials, particularly the unpublished documents and records which are basic in the administration of government, and which provide invaluable data for students of political, economic, and social history.

The successful conclusion of any phase of work of the Historical Records Survey, particularly one so involved and complex in its processes, would not be possible without the support of public officials, historical and legal specialists, educators, and librarians, and many other groups in the community. Their cooperation is gratefully acknowledged.

The Survey program was organized by Luther H. Evans, who served as Director until March 1, 1940, when he was succeeded by Sargent B. Child. The Survey operated until July 1, 1942 as a Nation-wide series of locally sponsored projects program in the Division of Community Service Programs, of which Mrs. Florence Kerr, Assistant Commissioner, is in charge. The work on this volume has been performed under the technical direction and editorship of Mr. Clifford L. Lord.

PREFACE

The New Jersey Historical Records Survey Project was organized February 1936, as a unit of the Works Progress Administration. It operated as a statewide project under the local sponsorship of the New Jersey State Planning Board. Until the war forced suspension of its peacetime program, the technical supervision of the Survey was exercised nationally by Mr. Sargent B. Child, National Director. State administrative supervision is provided by Mrs. Eva H. Reda-Reina. The project was under the additional supervision of Mr. R. C. Branion, Regional Director of WPA.

This Survey had as its objective the preparation of complete inventories of the municipal, county, State and Federal archives in New Jersey, and the publication of these inventories as guides to the material of greatest historical interest. In addition to these inventories, the work included the cataloging and calendaring of manuscript collections, the inventorying of church archives, and the transcription of some of the earliest public and church records. An additional feature of this comprehensive approach to authentic historical source material was found in the inventorying of American imprints and portraits in New Jersey.

The Survey was also engaged in compiling the monumental Atlas of Congressional Roll-Calls: An Analysis of Yea-Nay Votes, mapping, with analyses, roll-calls, and index of all the yea-nay votes in the Congress of the United States from 1775 - 1932. It was continuing the collection of the Messages and Papers of the Presidents, i.e. the messages, communications, proclamations, executive and administrative orders of the Presidents since January 21, 1937, bringing up to date the original compilation initiated by the Survey in New York. It maintained a cumulative list and index of all Presidential Executive Orders of the Unnumbered Series, containing all the entries in this book to which additional entries were to be added as discovered. It prepared a handbook of Federal District and Circuit Courts, consisting of maps showing the evolution of their jurisdiction, tables of all times and places of meeting, and complete rosters of their judges. The legislative ordinances of the Continental Congresses and the Congresses of the Confederation were being compiled for the first time, in a format based on that used in the United States Statutes at Large. Revised and up to date rosters of all members of the Congress of the United States from 1789 to date were also in preparation, and compilations of Presidential Executive Orders and Proclamations for twelve special topics, including Passport Regulations, Consular Regulations, Wildlife Conservation, Alien Entry Regulations, and National Forests were being assembled in order that this valuable and useful material might be made available to the public in its most usable form. All these work phases were handled by the Congressional Vote Analysis Unit under the technical direction of Clifford L. Lord, Consultant to the Survey, as Editor. To Mr. Lord must be accorded the acknowledgement of the Survey for planning and directing the execution of all editorial work in these phases, and for preparing the completed work for final publication. This publication, List and Index of the Presidential Executive Orders, Unnumbered Series, is the second of this series to be issued by the Survey to date.

Recent important administrative usage of the Presidential Executive

Order has centered new interest and appreciation on this form of government document. Today every such order must be filed with the Division of the Federal Register (formerly with the Department of State) in Washington, and approximately 8,500 orders have been so filed. When deposited with this agency, the orders are given official numbers, and thenceforth may be classified as being in the "numbered series". Many of these are now published in the Federal Register daily. But in earlier days, through administrative laxity, considerably less than half the Presidential orders were filed with the State Department, and the bulk of the earlier orders therefore received no official numbers. They constitute the "unnumbered series", of which this volume constitutes the first comprehensive list and index. A similar list and index of the orders of the numbered series is in preparation by the Historical Records Survey in New York City. Numbered and Unnumbered orders cover exactly the same fields. Both types are equally important. The only distinction that can be made between them is this arbitrary one, the state of being numbered, which depends entirely on whether or not the State Department received a copy for its files.

The total of unnumbered orders is unknown. Secretary of the Interior, Harold L. Ickes, once put it at fifteen thousand. Other estimates have run as high as fifty thousand. This volume, therefore, covers a very small portion of the total field. Thousands of additional orders are scattered throughout the early departmental files in Washington, and are not readily accessible. Others exist in collections of Presidential papers elsewhere in the country. It has seemed, therefore, worthwhile to make this preliminary list and index of such of the unnumbered orders as are known to exist.

As additional orders come to light, it is to be hoped that they may be added to such a list and index as this, so that eventually this great body of material may be opened to the American scholar and public servant. This Survey would welcome any suggestions or information as to additional sources or depositories of such orders for incorporation in future editions of this work.

The thanks of the Survey are extended to Columbia University which, through the Department of History and its Library staff, particularly Dr. C. C. Williamson, Miles O. Price, and Dorothy M. Peake, has contributed so much to the present volume. The staff of the National Archives has generously aided the editor in answering many of the questions of incorrect dating, and other problem entries which occur in the available printed Orders. To Dr. Philip Hamer is due special thanks. To him goes the credit for eliminating a number of possible errors. To us belongs the blame for any which may remain.

This list was largely prepared by Doty Hobart and Madelaine Caldecott. The Index was largely prepared under the supervision of Frank Roth, assisted by Madelaine Caldecott, Paul Heffernan and Randall Henderson. The section on the Civil Service was prepared by Joseph C. Vaughan. To this unit of Survey workers belongs chief credit for this volume.

Acknowledgement is also due to Helen Calhoun, James Mocerri and

John V. De Lacy, under whose supervision the unit operated at different times, and to John Millington, Carl Bostelmann, Louis A. Lupton and Harold Mountan, past and present Assistant State Supervisors, under whose administrative and editorial direction the Survey has operated in New Jersey.

The compilers of this volume wish to express their gratitude to Dr. Luther H. Evans and Sargent B. Child, former national directors of the Survey, and to Robert W. Allan and Edward J. Hamilton, successive State Administrators of WPA, for their personal advice and attention which were of inestimable aid to the production of this volume and to the continuance of the Survey under local sponsorship.

The Survey is also indebted to the New York State Historical Association for making possible the completion and publication of this volume.

INTRODUCTION

History of the Executive Order

The Presidential Executive Order in the last fifty years has become an instrument of broad and increasing importance, a fact made particularly obvious during the last few years. In use from the earliest days of the Republic, the Executive Order was at first most employed for the withdrawal from the public domain of lands for Indian, military, naval and lighthouse reservations, or other similar public purposes, and for the establishment, transfer and abolition of land districts and offices, supplementing acts of Congress. Later it was used for the creation, alteration or disposition of forest, oil, gas or coal reserves and for the withdrawal of public lands from sale or entry for purposes of accurate classification. It became an essential instrument in the evolution of the civil service, blanketting into the classified service additional positions as authorized by law, promulgating rules for the service, and making plentiful individual exceptions and exemptions from these rules, both with and without the approval of the Civil Service Commission. It was employed to effect various regulations applying to governmental employees outside as well as inside the growing classified service. It established days of mourning for the death of famous citizens. It established and altered certain Indian reservations, and extended Indian trust allotment periods. It was used to give public notice of changes of general interest in the regulations governing the consular and diplomatic services. Occasionally the Order has been used for the distribution of quasi-governmental funds such as the Virginus indemnity fund.¹ Actual allocations of direct government funds were first made by Executive Order in the distribution of certain blanket appropriations for the possessions newly acquired during the war with Spain.² Customs collection districts and offices, regulations for the early government of the Canal Zone, establishing army schedules of punishments and schedules of allowances for subsistence and quarters, soon came within the field of the Order.

During the World War the use of the Executive Order logically increased as executive authority and power increased, and its scope was greatly broadened. Government agencies such as the Food Administration, the Grain Corporation, the Committee on Public Information and the War Trade Board, authorized by law, were formally established, while others were reorganized under the Overman Act. Presidential powers were delegated to subordinate officers. Appropriations were allocated. Coal prices were fixed. Censorship of the foreign language press was established. Defensive sea areas were set up. Rules governing the behavior of enemy aliens were promulgated. The interned ships and enemy powers were assigned to various departments and agencies for use. Property in the hands of the Alien Property Custodian was offered for sale. Non-combatant duties for conscientious objectors to selective service were defined.

Federal rules for wartime radio broadcasting were established and bullion exports regulated.

During the administration of Franklin D. Roosevelt, also a period of great executive authority, the order has seen even wider and more vital usage, both in the administration of the New Deal, and in the evolution of the program of national defense.

Different types of Presidential Orders

The President may issue orders in any of three roles: as the civil executive carrying out specific authorizations of the Congress, as the administrative head of the Executive branch of the government, or as Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy. These different types of Presidential Orders today are known as "Executive", "Administrative", and "Military" Orders, respectively. However, prior to the present Administration no distinction was made between the first two, and many "Executive" orders have been of an administrative nature. In order that this volume together with the List and Index of the Orders of the Numbered Series, in preparation by the Survey in New York, may offer a complete guide to the Executive Order, Administrative Orders of the last few years are here listed, for though they are orders issued by the civilian Executive of the nation, they have not been included in the Numbered Series of Executive Orders. This volume also includes the so-called "Presidential Regulations" which have recently appeared. These are Executive Orders, but were not so headed through the inadvertence of the person who drafted the Order, and of the Bureau of the Budget, and the Department of Justice which today must pass on every Order prior to its submittal to the President. The List and Index does not include Military Orders, which are issued under a different authority and for very different purposes.

The President may also order one of his Cabinet to issue an Order in his name, or upon his direction. Such Orders are included in this List, provided that the issuing official expressly states that the Order is issued at the direction or command of the President, and that it is not a Military Order.

The President also very frequently sends letters or memoranda to his subordinates, directing them to do some particular thing, or clothing them with some particular power. These technically may be called "Presidential Letters" and as such are omitted from this compilation, except for a very few early letters which have the applicability and general interest of later Orders, and which have been accepted by earlier compilers of Executive Orders as being Orders in the modern sense.

Availability of the Executive Orders

Some compilations of Orders have been published on such special subjects as Indian Reservations, the Panama Canal, the PWA, Veterans' Regulations, etc. Civil Service Orders appear both in the Annual Report of the Civil Service Commission, and in the compilation known as Civil Service Acts, Rules, Regulations, etc. though in both compilations, many Orders are given only by abstracts of the original. Other orders appear in the United

States Code, the Panama Canal Record, the Handbook of N.R.A., the Codes of Fair Competition, the Reports of the Alien Property Custodian, Emergency Regulations Passed Prior to December 1917 (Dept. of Justice), and Immigration Laws and Regulations.

The recent Code of Federal Regulations of the United States contains a listing of all Orders cited anywhere in the Code, arranged both by Code title, i. e. by subject, and by number. But since the Code contains only Orders of current applicability and general interest, obviously many Orders are not there listed. Since its inception in 1895 under the General Printing Act of that year,³ the Documentary Catalog has listed every Executive Order printed in slip form by the Government Printing Office, whether included in the numbered series or not. From 1925 to 1936, these slip copies of Orders were made available in a small number of depository libraries throughout the country.

The Federal Register Act of June 26, 1935 (49 Stat. L. 500) provided for the transmission to a new Division [of the Federal Register] in the National Archives of three copies of certain types of public documents, including Executive Orders, prior to Presidential signature. This Division was charged with keeping the original when signed, and with transmitting one copy to the Government Printing Office for publication in the new Federal Register, the first copy of which appeared March 14, 1936.

There were to be printed in the Federal Register "(1) all Presidential proclamations and Executive Orders, except such as have no general applicability and legal effect, or are effective only against Federal agencies or persons in their capacity as officers, agents or employees thereof; (2) such documents or classes of documents as the President shall determine from time to time have general applicability and legal effect, and (3) such documents or classes of documents as may be required so as to be published by Act of the Congress."⁴ This naturally greatly increased the availability of many of the Orders for the period since 1936, but the restriction as to "general applicability and legal effect" substantially limits the number of Orders appearing in the Register. A large number of Orders still are published only in slip form, though every Order must today pass through the Division of the Federal Register, where it receives a number, whether subsequently published in the Register or not.

A full file of the Orders of the numbered series is maintained in the State Department records, National Archives, while current Orders are filed in the Division of the Federal Register. There is also a complete file of these Orders in the Law Library of Columbia University.

As will immediately be seen, all the above sources represent only partial approaches to the total mass and subject matter of the Executive Orders. Of the great bulk of the material in these Orders, there is today no complete file, no full list, no detailed index.

The Numbered and the Unnumbered Order

As has been stated in the preface, no distinction can be made between the numbered and unnumbered Order on the basis of subject matter, general applicability, public interest, or legal effect. The sole difference is an arbitrary one based entirely on whether the given Order does or does not bear a number.

This numbering was begun by the Department of State in 1907, at which time all of the relatively few Orders then on file in that Department were arranged chronologically and given a number, as was every Order subsequently filed. Those numbers are recorded in the Documentary Catalog from 1907 on (60th Congress ff). Back Orders later added to this file were given "in-between" numbers.⁵

But still many Orders did not make their way into the files of the State Department, and so did not receive numbers. President Hoover made a fairly successful attempt to end this situation and to regularize the preparation and handling of these documents by Executive Order 5220, of November 8, 1929,⁶ in which he outlined a procedure by which drafts of both proclamations and Orders were to be sent in triplicate to the White House via the State Department, each draft bearing a suitable title, and conforming both to the latest decisions of the United States Geographic Board on the spelling of geographical terms, and to the rules of the Style Manual of the Government Printing Office on orthography and punctuation. The State Department was to keep one copy of the draft Order and the signed original. This Order (5220) was slightly modified by Executive Orders 5658 of June 24, 1931, and 6427 of August 10, 1933. Orders approving NRA codes of fair competition were specifically excepted from this procedure by Executive Order 6497 of December 15, 1933. Present procedure is regulated by Executive Order 7298 of February 18, 1936.

The volume of unnumbered Orders was substantially reduced by the numbering system inaugurated in 1907. The procedural Orders since November 8, 1929, have practically eliminated the unnumbered Order.

Some eighty-nine hundred Executive Orders have so far found a place in the numbered series. This volume contains entries for over fifteen hundred unnumbered Orders. The importance of the data embodied, and the actions taken in these Orders has made this volume seem an addition worth making to the existing tools for the study of American history, law and government. To this material, the List is the calendar or chronological key, the Index the topical key.

Varieties of the Executive Order

As anyone who is acquainted with the earlier Executive Orders knows, no uniformity of form or style was established prior to 1873, when in the second administration of President Grant, the present form of the Order became relatively well established.

This variety of form creates the problem, particularly acute in the earlier years, of just what is and what is not to be classified correctly as an Executive Order. Where today the President would issue a formal and detailed Order based on a draft prepared for his signature by a Cabinet officer, many of his predecessors merely inscribed the word "Approved" at the bottom of a Cabinet member's recommendation. At other times, the President would write "Let it be done", or "I approve the accompanying recommendation, and order that it be effected". Some others were signed at the President's direction by his secretary, such orders being incorporated in the numbered series as late as 1899⁸. Some were signed, also at the direction of the President, or in the absence of both the President and the Vice-President, by the Secretary of State.⁹ In fact exactly half of the first thirty-two Orders of the numbered series (EOs 1 to 28-1 inclusive) were signed by the latter official. Recently the Federal Register has at least momentarily reverted to earlier practice and thereby has revived problems thought dead for fifty years by publishing in the numbered series occasional Orders of the departmental heads,¹⁰ which have the same effect in the same fields as earlier Presidential Orders. In compiling this List and Index considerable latitude has been allowed for the inclusion of documents which in the past have been considered and labelled Executive Orders by any Governmental Department or office, but we have nowhere included Departmental Orders which lack an explicit Presidential indorsement, or, alternatively, lack mention of the express direction of the President, upon which the order was issued.

A careful check was made of the files of the Executive Orders in the Division of the Federal Register in the fall of 1938, and no Order at that time included in the numbered series has been here listed.

The List

The List is based upon two major sources, (1) printed compilations of Orders on special subjects, and (2) references in other Orders, either numbered or unnumbered, to further Orders which do not themselves appear in the numbered series.

The reader may distinguish between these sources through the citations of each entry. Citations without parentheses refer to sources where the full text of the unnumbered Order is printed. Citations with parentheses point to mere references to unnumbered Orders.

Inevitably, entries of the first class are far more satisfactory than those of the second. In making entries of the former type, taken from the full texts of the Orders, three arbitrary devices have been adopted to make the distinction between the different forms of the early Orders apparent to the user. When the President merely marks "Approved" at the end of a document, the entry gives a brief bracketed abstract of the document followed by the word "approved".¹¹ If the President makes a slightly more lengthy statement but still one which, standing alone, conveys no indication of what action is being ordered, the recommendation is again abstracted but is followed with the word "indorsed". When the President issues an Order sufficiently approaching the present form of an Order as to be intelligible without reference to accompanying documents, we use neither "approved" nor "indorsed", but simply enter the gist of its subject matter. Another device identifies those early Presidential Letters which have come to be considered as Orders, though they are addressed to some specific person. Such Orders are footnoted "Addressed to Albert Gallatin, Secretary of the Treasury".¹² A similar device identifies those Orders issued by someone other than the President, either at his direction, or during his incapacity. Such Orders are footnoted "Signed by C. C. Sniffen, Secretary to the President",¹³ or "Signed by Levi Woodbury, Secretary of the Treasury".¹⁴

In the entries for many of the earlier Orders, it has been necessary, due to the brevity of the Presidential approval, or indorsement, to refer back to the accompanying documents to find out what the Order was designed to accomplish. In such cases, all material which does not actually appear over the President's signature, but which has been added to our entry for clarity, has been placed in brackets.

Entries taken from mere references to unnumbered Orders, the full text of which is not available, are less satisfactory. There is no way of knowing the exact form of such an Order, and therefore, no way of indicating whether the President has issued a full Order or merely indorsed or approved the recommendation of a member of his Cabinet. There is likewise no way of knowing exactly what information is contained in the Order. It is therefore impossible to indicate by the use of brackets what, if any, of the material of the entry was not actually used by the President. In some instances, typographical errors in the printed references to a given Order was issued on two or sometimes more dates. Furthermore there may exist a number of references to similar acts ordered on one day.¹⁵ They may have been effected by a group of individual Orders or, more probably, by a single Order. Lacking the text or texts, there is no way of satisfactorily solving such problems. If the texts of such Orders become available in the near future, this group of entries will be more satisfactorily handled in the next edition. It should be reiterated that parentheses around the citation warn the reader that he is dealing with this type of entry.

The Index

The reader may find the following information useful in consulting the index. All entries are arranged alphabetically by topic. Each entry ends with a series of figures representing the date of the Order, as "1889: 7 -23". The date alone may be all a reader wants, or with the date the reader may refer to the List entry for the Order of that date, and there obtain the citation or citations with which the text of the Order itself may be found in published compilations. This system provides more useful, specific and exact reference than a mere page citation to the List would offer.

See references are generally used in order to make it as easy as possible for the reader to locate the information he is seeking. Every governmental agency is listed under its full official title, with see references from the common name or inverted forms of that title. Independent agencies, commissions, etc. appear under their own formal title only. Bureaus and divisions of the regular Departments are listed under "U.S. Departments" under subhead by name of the Department, with the sub-head by name of the bureau or division. Orders applying to Cabinet officers are grouped under "U.S. Secretaries--State", etc. All federal courts are under "U.S. Courts", the Army under "U.S. Army", the Navy under "U.S. Navy", the Marine Corps under "U.S. Marine Corps".

Entries under "Public Domain" are arranged by State, with subhead by type of withdrawal. Those same entries, except for withdrawals for classification, mineral leases, and similar administrative Orders, are duplicated under the keyhead of the type of withdrawal. Thus an Order creating the Cocopah Indian Reservation in Arizona is listed both under "Public Domain--Arizona--Indian Reservations--Cocopah" and under "Indian Reservations--Cocopah, Ariz." This type of duplication exists for "Forests, National", "Game, Bird and Fish Preserves", "Parks, National", and "Monuments, National".

All entries to material pertaining to the Territories and possessions are indexed only under the name of the Territory or possession.


